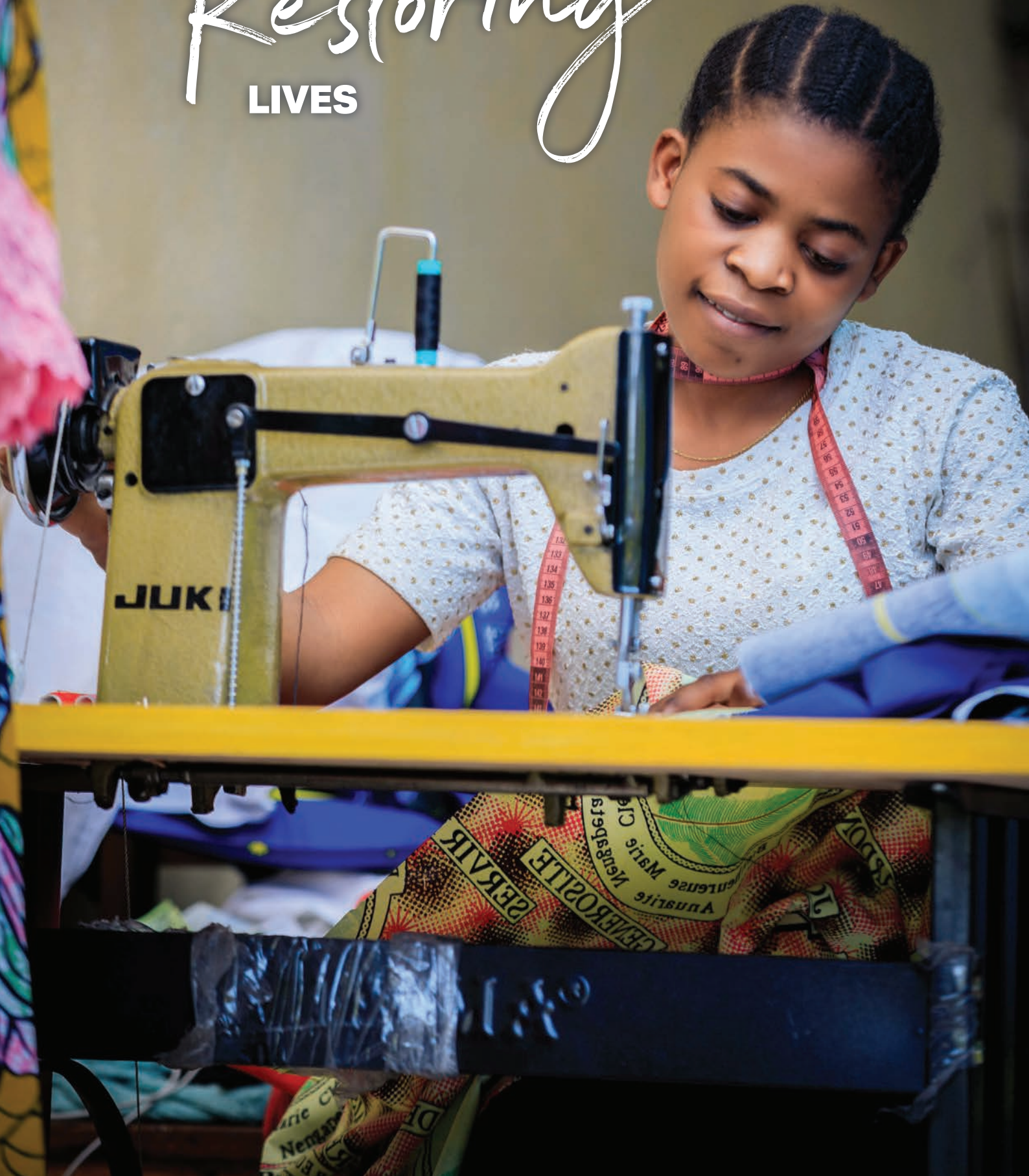

Harvest Hope Africa provides opportunities to build hope for vulnerable people. Patrick and Rebecca, founders and directors, are passionate about bringing hope, restoration, and transformation.

Having lived and worked in Africa for many years, they bring significant knowledge and experience. Now based in Australia, they established Harvest Hope Africa in 2019, to facilitate others joining the journey of providing opportunities for vulnerable people.

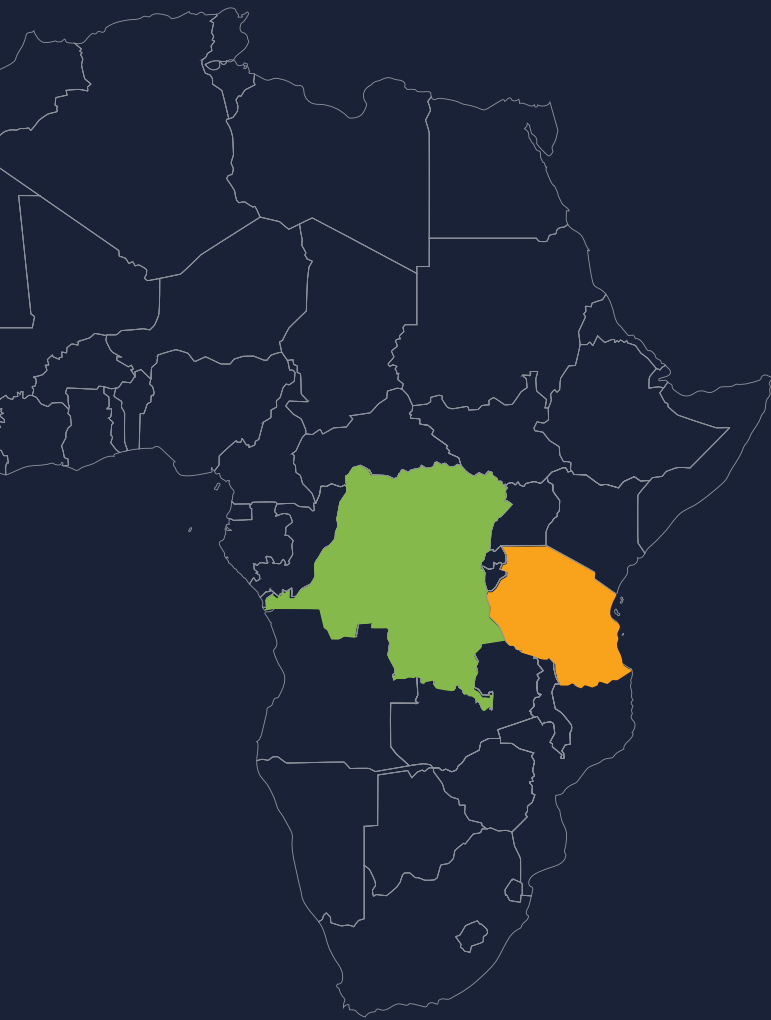


Born and raised in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Patrick witnessed the country's long history of conflict, political upheaval and instability growing up. As an adult, he lived and worked in multiple countries in Africa. An ardent believer in the power of individual action, Patrick looks to give people who are struggling today the belief in a better tomorrow. Patrick focused his work in 1990 –2012 on training leaders and working with charities to bring reconciliation and hope. He spent six years supporting the recovery of communities post the Rwandan Genocide. Patrick's formal training includes community development and education, and he fluently speaks many African languages.

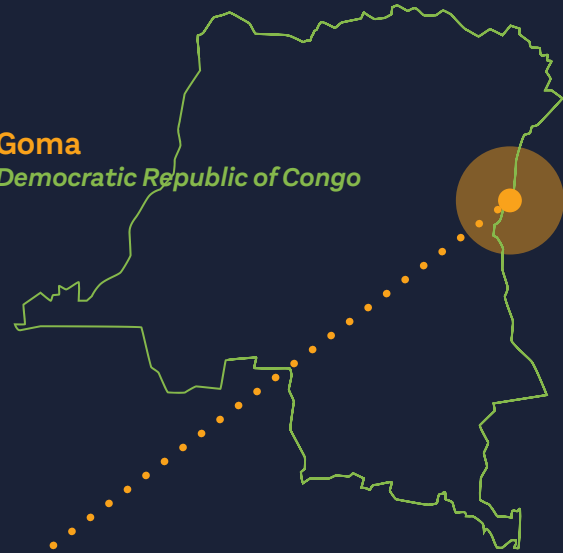


As a child, growing up in Australia, Rebecca was inspired by the work of charities providing support, and promised herself that one day, she would enable transformative change in the lives of people who needed it in Africa. Patrick met Rebecca in Tanzania, where she lived and worked as a teacher trainer for nine years. During her time in Tanzania, Rebecca travelled to many African countries and through local connections and personal experience, developed a deep understanding of the needs of impoverished people in Africa. Rebecca's formal training is in education, with over 15 years of educational leadership experience.

In 2012, Patrick and Rebecca moved to Australia with their children. Their local African connections led to Harvest Hope Africa's areas of commitment. Donations to Harvest Hope Africa fund capacity-building initiatives. These programs enable the individual to become self-sufficient, thereby creating sustainable change for the individual and their community and enabling Harvest Hope Africa to maximise their reach and impact.

Patrick and Rebecca have been deeply moved by the encouragement, assistance and of course, donations, provided by their supporters in Australia and around the world.

In the **Democratic Republic of Congo**, Harvest Hope Africa's projects are in the eastern city of **Goma**, which has faced long standing civil war. Amongst many of the innocent victims are girls and young women. Their opportunities to access education have been affected and tragically, the experience of sexual violence has been far too common. This often leaves girls and young women alone and desperate. Alongside a locally registered charity, Harvest Hope Africa has invested in training-based programs to provide a better future for these young women and their babies.

Harvest Hope Africa also works in an isolated **Masai area of Tanzania near Arusha**, where accessing quality education nearby is not possible. The families of the school live in traditional housing in the Longido district, with access to employment, health services and clean water, difficult. The school was founded with a vision to empower the community and improve quality of life by making education accessible.

HOW WE WORK

Our management team includes highly respected professionals with experience in international development, violence redress, human rights, finance, project management, medicine and education.

We work co-operatively with locally registered organisations in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Tanzania, to ensure transparency and accountability, drawing on strong local knowledge and expertise in our partnership and decision-making procedures.

Our programs director and project managers on the ground in Africa, bring decades of leadership experience. Our Africa programs director, Gentil Kasongo, has a master's degree in human rights, a law degree and many years' experience in the Great Lakes Region as a consultant in issues of justice and human rights. Gentil works closely with Patrick to supervise our two project managers; Daniel Kalimbiro, in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Amani Rukyaa, in Tanzania. Gentil and Patrick work directly with the project managers to design projects, give clear directions regarding expenditure of finances and operational guidance. Rebecca and our finance team works with Patrick and the project managers to ensure due diligence is followed, as well as Rebecca providing educational and leadership advice.

Harvest Hope Africa is Company Limited by Guarantee, with a constitution that defines the organisation’s mission, purposes, and powers.

Harvest Hope Africa is registered with Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission (ACNC) as a Public Benevolent Institution and is accountable to the ACNC’s External Conduct Standards. The standards cover:

- ◆ Annual review of overseas activities and record keeping
- ◆ Anti-fraud and anti-corruption
- ◆ Protection of vulnerable individuals

Harvest Hope Africa is governed by a voluntary Board of Directors. The board is comprised of 5 members, each with their own international aid experience and complementary professional skills.

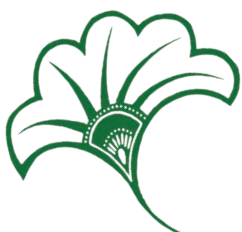

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

As I reflect on celebrating our 5th birthday in May this year, I am astounded by what we have achieved in such a brief time. Together, in five short years, we have raised over \$280,000 to make a real difference in the lives of those we serve.

Last year I had the privilege of travelling to the Democratic Republic of Congo and Tanzania to visit our projects firsthand. To say I was thrilled with the work of our team on the ground and the commitment of our participants is an understatement. The visit gave us the opportunity to assess our impact and inform our future strategic decisions to continually improve our work. What was clear beyond anything else was we certainly have the perfect dream team to grow our impact.

I am delighted to report that our operations over 2023-2024 have been extremely successful. Our programs have proven to be effective in equipping and empowering displaced, abused, and vulnerable people.

This year we have continued to see growth in impact, and I thank our team on the ground in Africa, both our employees and volunteers, and our community here in Australia for making this possible.

In the Democratic Republic of Congo, 50 students engaged in our sewing training program, learning the skills of tailoring, and running a small business. 45 of the participants recently sat the government national exams to gain their formal vocation certification. They are currently on work placements to gain further experience in running their own sewing business and will soon graduate. I am proud to share that we have made it a tradition for our students to receive a sewing machine kit as a graduation gift to support them in their





final steps to setting up their business and transitioning to independence. I congratulate each student for the immense courage demonstrated throughout their study. They are now in a position to be financially independent and provide for their young families.



Our work in Goma, Congo has been complicated by the civil war and recent increased unrest in the broader Goma area, bringing a large influx of vulnerable people into the city. This, alongside our strong reputation has resulted in our waitlists to enter our program becoming significantly longer.

We have maximised our abilities with our current funding and are working to increase our donations so we can meet this growing need and expand, offering alternative vocational training.

In Tanzania we focused our efforts on supporting an isolated primary school, providing education for 55 vulnerable children in Masailand. We provided salaries, access to clean water on site, food, and teaching and learning resources.

I thank our team of volunteers in Africa who work tirelessly to ensure our projects are implemented. In particular, I would like to acknowledge our program managers for their generosity of heart and service as they lead the team with dedication and commitment to our vision.

Lastly, I would like to thank our donor community in Australia. We recognise it has been a challenging year for many families, and your unwavering financial partnership has made the work possible. This work continues because of your partnership. Thank you for standing with us and being part of making a difference. Lives are being transformed because of you.





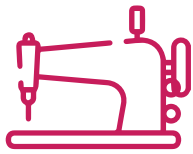

Hearing the students gratitude, we felt incredibly proud of all our team has accomplished. Having waited since the first Covid breakout to be on site, it was confirmed at that point, we were in for a great few days.

We sat with students in the sewing training program as they spoke of the transformation and emotional healing they were experiencing by participating in our programs.



Heading to the Co-operative, we met students who had graduated over the last few years; the joy and confidence they exuded was palpable. It was with great pleasure we promptly ordered a few shirts for Patrick.

Aware of the conflict around Goma, we visited an active volcano and displaced camp nearby. This was almost too hard to absorb, given the reason our projects exist. Words will never explain.

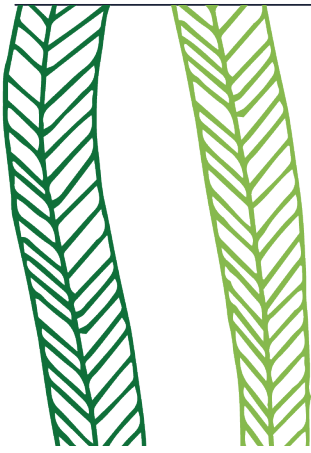

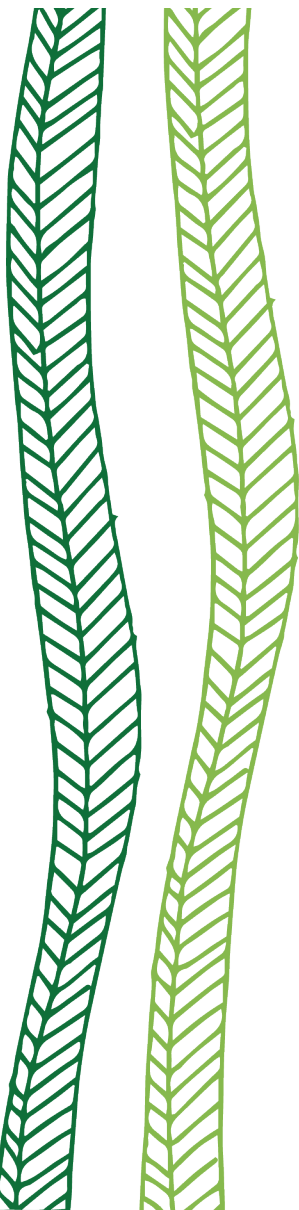

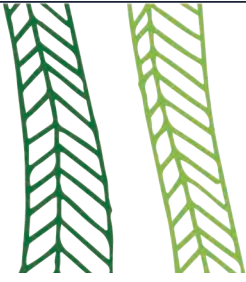
SEWING TRAINING PROGRAM, GOMA

This year our fifth intake of students participated in our sewing training program. Our students; teenage girls with a background of sexual violence and consequential babies, have displayed great courage as they progressed through our sewing training program. This did not come without its struggles. These young women continue to battle trauma and look after their babies, when they themselves are still maturing. 50 young women managed to learn a new trade and eventually, pass their exams. Their commitment and resilience mean they will soon graduate, celebrating a year of learning and increased independence.

Graduating students are invited to join our co-operative program. This facility is especially helpful for students who live in and around Goma, where they can access continued mentorship, professional feedback, quality equipment and a safe place to work as they build their business.

"People in my community barely believe I can make these clothes. I can make all sorts of outfits and even school uniforms. I am so proud of myself."

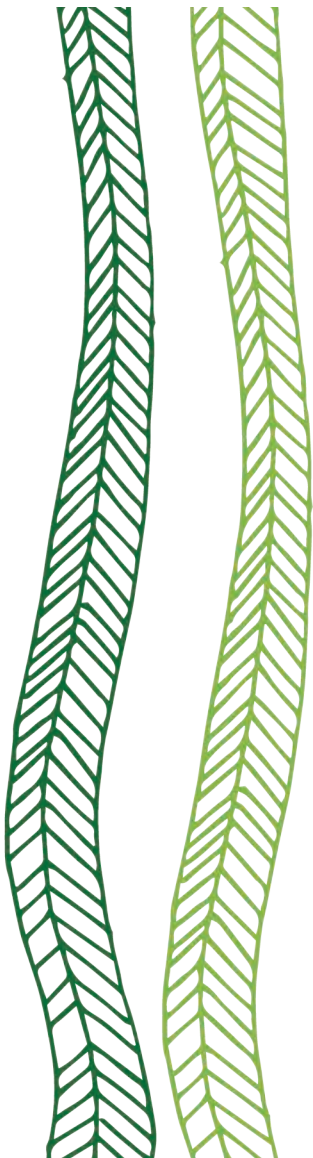


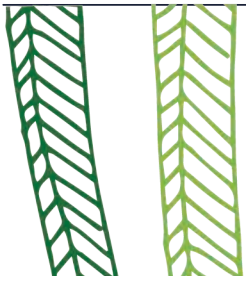
We acknowledge the importance of our food program.

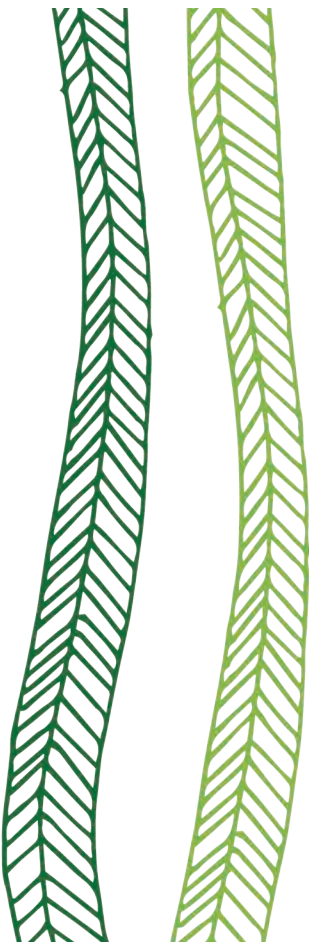

PSYCHOLOGICAL THERAPY

To support our students’ wellbeing development, we offer psychological therapy.

Students come with significant background trauma. Our psychologist, Norbert, comes once a week and is available to students who would like to have 1:1 sessions. We have prioritised this service for the younger students and those who have suffered more complex trauma.

Norbert also runs group sessions for the students focusing on common wellbeing issues. Host families are invited to be involved in special sessions so they can learn how to be of greater support to our students in their home and community environment.

“I came to Goma from Bwreremana having lost my family during the conflict. I had no one to help me until I found out about this training centre. I was accepted and not only did I learn to sew, I got the psychological help I needed to start the next season of my life. It is a miracle.”

Elizabeth completed her degree in fashion last year, graduating with distinctions.

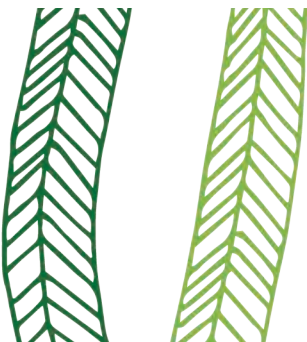

Katerine (pseudonym) has been with us for many years.

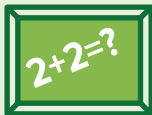
We originally met her as an 11 year old orphan with aids who wound up at the rape crisis centre. Patrick and Rebecca agreed to find her a host family and send her back to school. After many years of support and medical intervention, Katerine is well and we are making her dream of studying at university come true. Katerine is about to start her second year of Computer Engineering. While in Congo, Patrick and Rebecca visited Katerine at her host's home. They report it was an incredibly joyful experience, where they got to witness the fruits of 7 years of investment into a life transformed for Katerine.

TANZANIA

EBENEZA PRIMARY SCHOOL

We partner with a remote Primary School in the Longido region of Tanzania. The families are from the Masai tribe, living in traditional housing in nearby villages. The school takes students in their first year of schooling and has 55 students.

The cost of living continues to grow in Tanzania and so again, this fiscal year we have increased teacher wages. Amani Rukiyaa, our project manager in Tanzania has completed his first year with us, putting into place new, effective operational systems. Amani is an accountant with considerable experience in working with international charities based in Tanzania. His structured approach to leading places the school in a good position for future growth.

Our community has faced a lot of challenges this year with the rising cost of living. Our families struggle significantly, but because of our school, the children will have a better future. It is a long-term investment and a lot of work, but it is worth it.

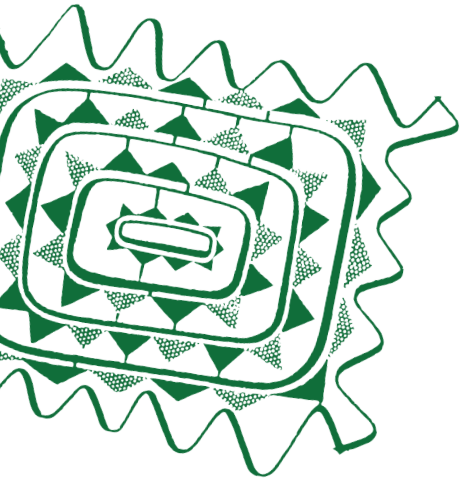
FOOD PROGRAM

A key strategy to provide an environment for the students to be happy and learn well is our food program. The results of this program have been improved health, wellbeing and learning of both students and staff. Over the year, we have observed students' nutrition improve, and joy build. This is an essential building block to learning.

"The families of our students don't have food. Nothing grows out there. The children may have an extremely basic meal in the evening of ugali, which is ground maize, if they are lucky. The land is so barren and any water that is there is filthy.

The food program at the primary school is an enormous blessing to the students. It provides essential nutrition to help them grow and learn well."

A FUTURE WITH FRESH WATER

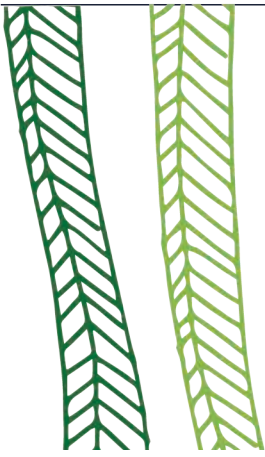
After our founders, Patrick and Rebecca Lubilanji visited the school last year, they agreed to help the community research potential sources of water. We have been communicating with government officials, the community, and bore water specialists to see what options are available.

The exciting news is there could be water a few hundred metres underground, right on our school site. Our next step is to raise \$25,000 to start drilling.



ENTREPRENEURSHIP TRAINING PROGRAM

We provide an Entrepreneurship Training Program to support vulnerable mothers of the school community who have been abandoned or widowed. The women learn basic business and entrepreneurship skills as well as specific skills, including soap making. The women also learn about issues of health, including hygiene. This is a small program with significant potential to make an enormous impact on the lives of many more families in need.

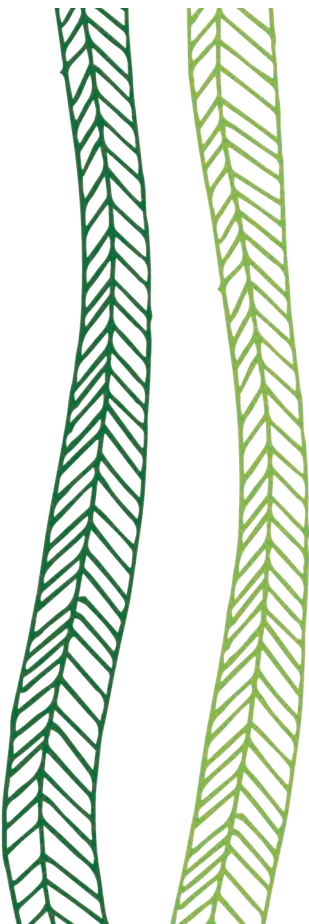

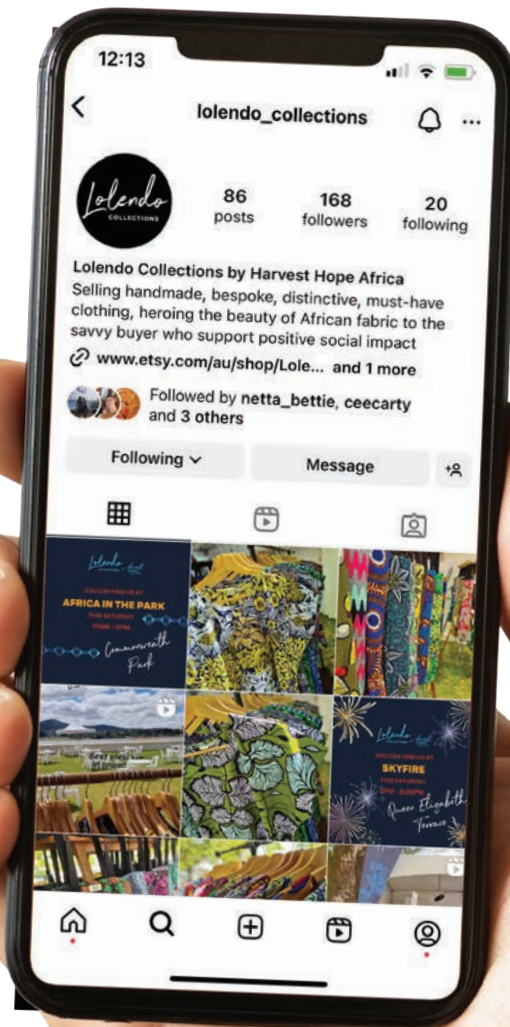
Lolendo Collections is our social enterprise with a vision to make both local and global impact by promoting culture for an equitable world.
